

Federal and State Laws Protect Children With Disabilities

- Federal Laws that grant rights to children with disabilities
 - §504 of the Rehabilitation Act (Civil Rights Law For the Disabled) 1973
 - Individuals with Disabilities Education Act 2004 (IDEA) 20 USC § 1400 et. Seq.
- In NJ State Law
 - N.J.A.C. 6A:14-1 <u>et seq.</u> & 18A:46-1 <u>et seq.</u>
- Case Law
 - Both State and Federal case law

The IDEA's Mandate

- Entitles all children who meet the definition of "a child with a disability" to receive:
 - A Free Appropriate Public Education (FAPE)
 - In the Least Restrictive Environment (LRE)

March 2020 Federal Special Education Guidance

- School districts must ensure that, students with disabilities are provided FAPE [Free Appropriate Public Education] to the "greatest extent possible."
- •FAPE is, at a minimum, the special education and related services identified in the student's IEP developed under IDEA, or a plan developed under Section 504.

March 2020 Federal Special Education Guidance Cont'd...

- Once school buildings re-open, the IEP team will need to determine "whether compensatory services are needed" to ensure FAPE.

Initial Referrals for Special Education

- Referrals may still be made
- Provide Early Intervention evaluations to district
- Some testing may be delayed
- Proceed with testing that can be conducted via telephone or videoconference
- If IEP is delayed, may require compensatory education

IEP Annual Review Meetings

- Via teleconference
- Crafted to reflect <u>school-based</u> <u>program</u>, not distance learning
- IEP is Stay-put
- Will be used to determine compensatory education



Temporary Plan

- Implementation of some IEP services may not be possible or practicable.
- A **temporary** plan may be helpful to accommodate the extenuating circumstances.
 - Developed by case manager with parent collaboration and with creativity to meet the individual needs of the child during the COVID-19 crisis.
- Do not modify IEP

Compensatory Education

- Request services and raise concerns about provided services now and document them to preserve compensatory education claims.
- It is critical to keep data on progress and/or regression of skills (as best you can) so that an accurate assessment of the need for compensatory education can be made **when students return to school**.



School District Responses & Student Needs

- School Districts are responding differently to this unprecedented crisis.
- Equity in access.
- Students with severe autism may not be able to take advantage of remote learning due to the limitations this type of learning presents.

Telehealth/Videoconference

- Telehealth services, including ABA,
 Speech, OT, PT services, are being made available in certain states.
- NJ Example law and regulations revised to allow for related services over video because previously prohibited

Waivers

- Different types of waivers.
- Districts should not condition receipt of services on parental waivers of IDEA rights.
- Parent observation of group lesson.
- Do not waive any rights to compensatory education or to challenge educational services being offered during the closure of schools due to the COVID-19 crisis.

Graduation Issues

- Many transition programs with community based instruction can not run due to social distancing
- Graduation may be delayed to provide compensatory education.



Procedural Concerns


- Timelines waiting for federal guidance
- Some reevaluation assessments can be done remotely with parental consent.
- In-person testing/observations will need to be postponed.
- Mediation and due process can still be initiated during COVID-19 crisis regarding FAPE violations.

Barriers Faced By Students with Severe Autism

- Lack of in-person support may lead to ineffective teaching and/or dangerous situations.
- Safety issues: addressing severe challenging behaviors versus working on skill acquisition.

Barriers Faced By Students with Severe Autism Cont'd...

 Implementation of behavior intervention plans may not be possible for parent to implement without an additional person present.



Barriers Faced By Students with Severe Autism Cont'd...

 Significant barriers to noneducational services such as State and Medicaid funded in-home services, insurance funded ABA services, State and Medicaid funded emergency placements and hospitalizations.

Residential Placements

- Pursuant to the FAPE provision of the IDEA school districts may be required to provide a residential placement, which must be provided at no cost to the child's parent or guardian. 20 U.S.C. §1401(9)(A); 34 C.F.R. §300.17(a); N.J.A.C 6A14-1.1(d)(1)
 - Note: FAPE is a federal entitlement and a school district cannot require a family to pursue state funding or health insurance.
 - Seminal 3rd Circuit Residential Placement Case:
 Kruelle v. New Castle County School District,
 642 F. 2d 687 (3d Cir. 1981)

Advocacy

- Federal Advocacy: CARES Act allows Betsy DeVos to request waivers to federal requirements.
 - Note: While the CARES bill requires the Secretary of Education to send a report to Congress on any IDEA waivers she may request regarding the COVID-19 crisis, no IDEA waivers can be granted without approval from Congress.
 - Consortium For Citizens with Disabilities (CCD) April 3, 2020 letter to DeVos opposing IDEA and Rehabilitation Act waivers.

State Advocacy:

- Importance of connecting with and supporting your state's educational advocates.
- NJ advocacy online related services & waivers.
